## What the apostles do

- 1 We look at the photographs and let the children describe them. What do you think impresses Simone so much?
- What do the apostles do? Aided by the photographs, we explain to the children what the tasks of the apostles are. (They proclaim God's word, baptize, seal, forgive sins, ordain ministers.)
- Why do the chief apostle and the apostles ordain ministers? The chief apostle and the apostles cannot be everywhere, that is why they need many helpers to serve God's children in the congregations.
   The chief apostle and the apostles ordain all these ministers.
   Also your priest and your deacon were ordained by an apostle.
- We are happy and thankful that God's people have a chief apostle and that each child of God has an apostle. We speak to the children about them (names, where they live, their visits to the congregation).
