At the time Christ was born, Augustus, the Roman emperor, ruled over many countries, including Israel, where Joseph and Mary lived. So he sent out his messengers to proclaim to his subjects that he has ordered a census to be held, and that every citizen must therefore travel to his home town to register. ry and Joseph are very tired.




