Her mother had said to her on the first day: "Andrea, if you stay in bed for a few days, you'll soon be well again." But bed is such a boring place, and to stay there all day is not easy, especially when the other children are playing outside and it would be such fun to join them. Andrea just can't resist it. Instead of staying in bed, she sneaks to the window again and again, opens it and watches the goings-on outside. When she hears her mother outside her bedroom door, she quickly jumps back into bed, but Mother of course notices what she is up to. She sighs and says: "Andrea, you are so impatient. I'm sure you have caught cold again. The fever will never go down this way." Andrea is ashamed, but it is so boring

Mother was right of course. That evening Andrea is once again

hot and flushed, her eyes bright and feverish. She can hardly eat anything as swallowing is very difficult and painful. Mother has to give her some more of that terrible medicine and says: "I am really worried about you. If only you were a little more sensible! This evening our Priest is visiting us. You will have to stay in bed, but I am sure he'll look in on you. I'd be happy if you were to tell him the whole story. Will you do that?" Andrea nods. She likes the Priest; he always has time for her. When he comes into her room that evening with her parents, she looks at him expectantly. He sits down beside her and enquires how she is feeling. Andrea tells him quite honestly that she got out

- 2 By means of simple questions we encourage the children to talk about their bearers of blessing. What are their names? What have you experienced with them? Do you know what a Priest does? (They bless, comfort, forgive sins by the commission of their Apostle, perform other ministerial tasks ...)

  In the following stories we try to illustrate the work of a Priest as seen by children. (The relating of own experiences would be very welcome.)
- Wherever possible, we obtain a photograph of each child's rector which they paste in the book. They may draw a decorative frame around it. Underneath we write the rector's name.
