She was having a lot of pain in her knee and could barely move. The children whispered amongst themselves: "She should go herself. We are playing now." Mrs. Boegli barely closed the window before the children were engrossed in their game again. Only Verona started to think. She had to think about her grandmother, who also complains about pains in her knee. She nudged her friend and said: "Come, let us go!" The two girls rang the bell at Mrs. Boegli's front door. The old woman was extremely surprised and thankful that the girls wanted to help her. When they came back from the bakery, they received a chocolate bar as a thank-you gift.



During role play the children re-enact the encounter of the old woman with the two girls

- II. 7 We sing and discuss the song: "Fear not."



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


Andrea plays with several neighborhood children. Her mother calls: "Come with me. I am going to church to decorate the altar and you can help me." Andrea is not enthused. "We are playing so nicely," she grumbles. But then she obeys. First they buy flowers and Andrea diligently helps in the selection. Because that is so much fun, she forgets about the other children. At the church her mother makes a beautiful arrangement. Andrea passes her the individual flowers. "This rose is especially pretty. You should put it in the middle," she recommends to her mother, who nods. She is happy that her Andrea gladly helps. During service Andrea sits beside her mother. Since she is still quite young, she does not understand very much. But when the Priest mentions the flowers on the Altar, she looks at her mother and beams.

We will discuss who is happy about the flowers. (Andrea, the mother, the congregation, the brothers who serve along) Why are they happy?

Together we will make an arrangement out of real (or handcrafted) flowers. (It can be a gift for a sick child who could not attend Sunday School, on behalf of the Rector...)

Every child draws a flower, cuts it out and glues it on a large piece of paper. When the name of the child is written on the flower, the group picture can be hung on the door. It will greet the children every Sunday and make everyone aware of who is in Beginners' Sunday School.



With some guidance perhaps the children can make the flower arrange for the sacristy themselves.						
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

The mouse gives a thousand thanks and says: "If I can ever help you, I will." The lion laughs: "How could a little mouse help me?" In the night the lion wants to prey on sheep in the field. He has often done this before. Therefore, the shepherd is angry with the robber. He has erected a large net to capture the lion. During the night the lion is caught in the net. With all his strength he tries to rip it apart. He has no success. All his rage does not help him. Finally the lion roars with every fiber of his being so that he can be heard for miles around. The mouse also hears it and comes quickly to him. He wants to know what is wrong with the lion. As the mouse sees that he is caught in the net, it whispers to him: "Be really still, I can help you." The mouse calls to the other mice. They come quickly. With their sharp teeth, they chew on the netting. Before it is light the mice have chewed a large enough hole so that with a mighty shove the lion can escape. The lion runs immediately into the forest. He is so glad he let the mouse live that morning; otherwise it would not have been able to help him now.
