Thank you

Henry is five years old and is spoiled for his age. His mother loves him dearly. She cannot refuse him a single wish. When Henry says: "I am hungry!" right away his mother gives him a piece of chocolate and looks at him while waiting for a thank you in return. The boy takes it without a word and takes off. Thoughtfully, his mother looks at him. It goes like this for a while. One day Henry makes a necklace by cutting little stars out of gold foil. With great pride he takes his little gift to his mother. She takes it without a word and puts it in the bedroom. Henry is upset. Offended he says: "If you do not like my gift then you can give it back to me." The mother asks: "Why do you think that I do not like your stars?" Henry says: "You could have said something!" "You are right" says the mother "you know, when you were a little child, your dad and I taught you to be thankful. I believe that you are now big enough to understand this." What the mother wanted to say with this, first became clear to the boy when she offered him an apple. He says: "Thank you very much, mom!" and his mother replies: "Thank you very much for the star necklace, Henry." Both look at each other and smile.



Children talk about their own experiences that they made when giving thanks. The teacher makes clear that to say 'Thank you' is good manners but more so it should come from one's innermost feelings. A 'Thank you!' which comes from the heart is something very beautiful. Thankfulness can be experienced when one brings joy to someone else. The children think about ways of bringing joy to someone. They bring joy to each other, to their brothers and sisters or their parents.



Mother is ill



The whole family gathers around her bed and discusses the situation. Quickly, the most urgent tasks are assigned. Father prepares the breakfast. The children put plates and cups on the table. After breakfast, father says good bye and leaves for work. The children have to get dressed by themselves. It is difficult for them to say good bye to their mother. On their way to kindergarten and school, they look back in vain; mother is not standing at the window waving. In kindergarten, one of the teachers tells Sandra that she put her top on inside out. When they get home, there is no aroma of a delicious meal. The beds have not been made and look the same as they did in the morning. The children help their father with the cooking. After the meal, there is little time left to play. Together they clean up the kitchen. In the next few days, there are many tasks that the children have to do for the first time. How nice now, that they can speak with their mother so she can offer guidance. They are amazed how many chores their mother takes care of, day in and day out. All wait for mother to be well again. They pray, time and again, for mother's health and are very happy and thankful when she is healthy again.



We talk about everything that the mother does. In a pantomime game, activities are played out for other children to guess: cleaning dishes, ironing, vacuuming, mending, praying, etc.

The children draw the one they like best.

The children think about what things our Heavenly Father has given them: a bed to sleep in, the white sweater and the blue shoes, the meal at lunch, the



teddy bear and the building blocks. He also created the world: the sun that tickles my nose in the morning, the rain that makes those big puddles, the trees to climb up, the animals with their soft fur, the shiny stone and the brook...

The teacher sketches all these things on individual sheets of paper. We are amazed. To deepen the experience, a game can be played.

The children think about what gifts and talents our Heavenly Father has given them: I can speak, laugh, sing, jump and run. I can cry, shout, throw a tantrum, make faces, climb up trees,

make a somersault, jump on one leg, I can help, comfort, make others laugh... The children try these activities.
